INFRASTRUCTURE: City streets and parks should be maintained before new projects are undertaken. Existing infrastructure should not be allowed to deteriorate while tax dollars are spent on new construction.

TRANSPORTATION: Transportation decisions are often made by special-interest committees. Drivers and neighborhood residents need a stronger voice in the decision-making process. Comprehensive Plan Policy 8.28 (June 2016) should be more broadly implemented. It states: "Ensure the costs of constructing and providing public facilities and services are equitably shared by those who benefit from the provision of those facilities and services."

JUST SAY NO TO BAT LANES ON 82nd AVENUE: Replacing curb travel lanes with BAT lanes could divert as many as 5000 vehicles a day and increase travel times for up to 20,000 cars and trucks per day. Emissions, fuel consumption and transportation costs for goods and services will be increased adding to inflation at the grocery store and elsewhere. BAT lanes could negatively affect the many small and minority-owned businesses along 82nd that depend on customers arriving by car.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS/PUBLIC SAFETY: Increase funding to add police officers and ensure every fire station is fully staffed. Drug dealing must be addressed through consistent law enforcement, prosecution, and public safety efforts.

HOMELESSNESS: The priority should be helping people achieve long-term stability through wraparound services that support self-sufficiency. Housing is only a piece of the solution.

PROSPERITY: Portland needs to become more affordable inclusive of a competitive business environment encouraging job creation and investment.

COMPROMISE: The City Council needs a process of finding middle ground when differing viewpoints cannot reach agreement.

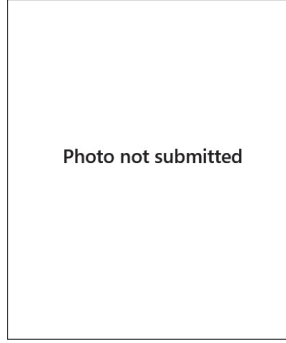

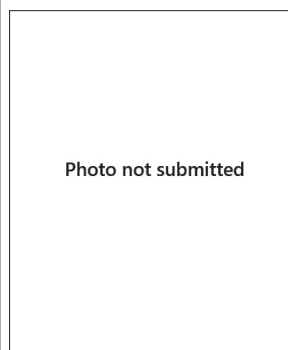
