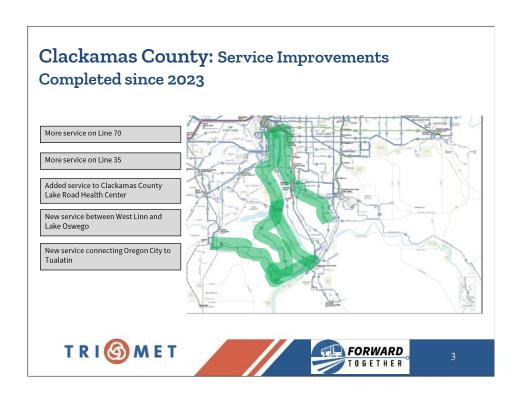

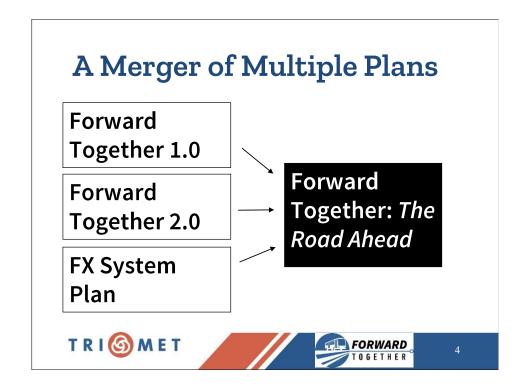
- Forward Together was originally conceived as a financially-constrained service concept, but our financial forecast has changed
- We have implemented many improvements already
- Further service improvements are on hold indefinitely

TriMet Budget Forecast and Service Impacts

- TriMet is facing cost increases across labor, security, vehicles, facilities, contractors, equipment and software
- Fare revenue has not yet recovered and the State failed to pass the transportation package
- We've been using our reserve funds and currently must cut \$300 million within three vears
- We're cutting costs internally but cuts to our transit service are unavoidable

Meeting climate goals takes collective action



Business as usual emissions

The transportation and building actions in the CCAP close the gap between business-as-usual emissions and state climate goals by ~25%.

Existing state climate policies and programs close the gap by another ~45%.

Collective action is needed to close the remaining ~30% of the gap, which could include:

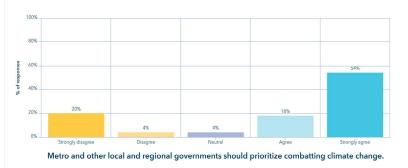
- Addressing natural gas emissions

- Shifting to low-carbon food

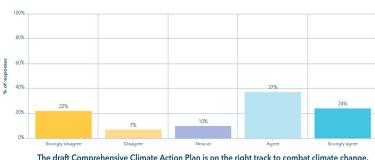

Draft CCAP comment period / online open house #2

- Metro released the draft CCAP for public comment from 8/5-9/4.
- Metro launched an online open house and survey to collect feedback and accepted comments on the draft CCAP via email.
- Today we are sharing feedback received as of 8/27/25.

Attitudes about climate change / the CCAP





The draft Comprehensive Climate Action Plan is on the right track to combat climate change

Of 152 respondents...

- 72% support local / regional government action on climate
- 61% say that the draft CCAP is on the right track
- There is majority support (>70%) for every action in the CCAP

Findings by sector

- Investing in **existing buildings receives the greatest support** of actions that focus on **buildings**.
- Though **71% of respondents support road pricing**, it receives less support than other **transportation** actions (which 82-85% support).
- Among actions related to **food, goods and services**, **composting receives the most support** (93%), followed by **reusing / preventing** waste (84%).

Date: September 5, 2025

Overview

Following is a summary of the September 5 TPAC Meeting. Meeting materials can be found here.

General Updates & Committee Updates from around the Region

- <u>Fatal Crash Update</u>: According to recent data available, there were approximately twenty-three traffic deaths from July 1 to August 31 across Clackamas, Multnomah, and Washington counties. Of this total, eight died while walking, eleven people died while driving a motor vehicle, two died while operating a motorcycle, one died while bicycling, and one died as a passenger in a motor vehicle. Six fatalities occurred in Clackamas County. Metro continues their commitment to a safe systems approach, advocating for safe streets, speeds, and people. Some actions regional partners are taking for safer streets include:
 - ODOT: advanced safer streets and speeds on Hwy 224 with \$23.3 million in safety improvements including median island, guardrails, repaving, striping and signage, ADA upgrades and a new bike crossing at Monroe connecting to Milwaukie Greenway. More information can be found here.
 - <u>RTC</u>: the Southwest Washington Regional Transportation Council (RTC) advanced a safer system
 with the adoption of Clark County's first Transportation Safety Action Plan in June 2025. More
 information can be found here.
 - PBOT: in their Safe Routes to School program, PBOT supported safer people and streets by launching a \$50,000 bike bus wayfinding pilot with bilingual signage and pavement markings at nine elementary schools citywide through Metro's Regional Transportation Options grants. More information can be found here.
 - O <u>Discussion</u>: In addition to the content described here each month, TPAC members expressed an interest in better tracking progress on reductions of fatal crashes towards established goals.
- Minutes Approved: The July 11 TPAC minutes were approved with no changes.
- <u>MTIP Amendments:</u> TPAC recommended JPACT approve MTIP Resolution 25-5519, for the purpose of adding, amending, or canceling thirteen projects to the 2024-27 MTIP to meet federal project delivery requirements. MTIP amendment summaries can be found in the September TPAC meeting <u>packet</u>.

Comprehensive Climate Action Plan: Feedback and Comments on Draft Plan

Overview: Metro staff presented the draft Comprehensive Climate Action Plan (CCAP), developed with support from the EPA's Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. The CCAP builds on the 2024 Priority Climate Action Plan by expanding the focus to a 25-year horizon, identifying strategies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions across transportation, land use, and other sectors. The draft actions were shaped through ten months of technical analysis and regional engagement, and are designed to align with parallel planning work in Oregon and Washington. TPAC members were asked to provide feedback on the scope and prioritization of actions, as well as

the plan's alignment with regional transportation investments and available resources. This input will inform revisions before the CCAP is finalized and submitted to EPA.

Discussion Highlights:

- Metro staff reported that the most aggressive CCAP actions could potentially close roughly 25% of the region's remaining greenhouse gasses gap, with state policies covering another 45%, leaving a 30% reduction challenge still to be addressed.
- Members noted transportation actions are more regionally coordinated but are also more capitalintensive, while building sector actions are often more cost-effective.
- Committee members cautioned that the "high scenario" assumptions (e.g., transit service growth) are ambitious given near-term fiscal realities and may set unrealistic expectations without additional funding mechanisms.
- TPAC members urged Metro to expand cost-effectiveness framing beyond capital efficiency to include housing affordability, equity impacts, and broader community benefits.
- Committee members stressed that implementation must be transparent about what is feasible in the near term and how the CCAP integrates into the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Climate Smart Strategy.

Next Steps:

- Metro staff to synthesize public and partner feedback, with a more comprehensive report prepared for the September 30 Climate Partners Forum.
- Metro Council review and discussion of the final CCAP draft in October, with Council action anticipated in November. The final report to EPA is targeted for December.
- The CCAP work will inform the next RTP update and Regional Climate Strategy refresh beginning in 2026.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The CCAP highlights a tension between ambition and capacity; the biggest levers appear to be the most resource intensive. How the CCAP influences the Metro RTP and Climate Smart Strategy remain to be seen.

State Review of Metropolitan Greenhouse Gas Reduction Target Rules

<u>Overview</u>: The Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) is reviewing the state's greenhouse gas reduction target rules for metropolitan planning organizations, including Metro. These rules set the framework for how the region's transportation and land use plans must demonstrate progress toward statemandated climate goals. DLCD staff outlined the review process, which will consider technical analysis, progress since the last rule adoption, and consistency with state and federal climate policies. TPAC members were invited to discuss potential implications for local and regional planning, particularly around integration with the Regional Transportation Plan and other policy commitments. Feedback from this session will help inform DLCD's recommendations to the Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC).

Discussion Highlights:

- TPAC members questioned whether targets should continue to be tied to vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reduction given the growing electrification of vehicle fleet and its impact on emissions outcomes.
- TriMet expressed support for ambitious targets but noted that near-term financial limitations and service cuts could undermine the region's ability to achieve them.
- Members raised concerns about the feasibility of targets under current conditions, citing regulatory uncertainty, federal litigation regarding zero emissions vehicles, and reductions in purchase incentives.

Next Steps:

- DLCD will release a draft staff report in late November, incorporating state and local input, followed by a public comment period.
- LCDC hearing scheduled for December 4–5, to determine whether updates to the metropolitan GHG reduction targets are warranted.
- Continued coordination with ODOT, DEQ, ODOE, and local partners through the Every Mile Counts partnership.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

The uncertainty over near-term financial limitations, including transit service presence and level of service, raises the risk that targets may be out of alignment with local implementation capacity.

Date: July 16, 2025

Overview

Following is a summary of the July Metro Technical Advisory Committee (MTAC) Meeting. MTAC is a 35-member committee of planners, citizens and business representatives that provides detailed technical support to the Metro Policy Advisory Committee (MPAC). Meeting materials can be found here.

General Updates

- Community Connector Transit Study: Chair Kehe provided a brief update on behalf of Metro Senior Transportation Planner Ally Holmqvist. During August recess, they will work on touchpoints offline. MTAC can expect an email next week with a link to a packet of materials to review. In August, they will seek out feedback on focus areas. A workshop will then be planned to review the focus areas from the feedback gathered in August.
- Mpact Conference: Chair Kehe announced the annual Mpact Transit + Community Conference
 will be held in Portland this October. The conference focuses on the potential for transit and
 connecting mobility options, supportive land use and development. There are scholarships
 available for students, educators, nonprofits, and community-based organizations. Contact Chair
 Kehe for more information regarding scholarships. More information on the conference is
 available here.

Metro District Annexation Updates

Metro staff presented on a recent change to state law concerning annexations to Metro's service district boundary with the passage of House Bill 2356 this past session. The legislation amends state law such that territory already within the UGB is annexed to the Metro service district when it is annexed by a city, without the need for a separate Metro annexation application. The bill will take effect in January 2026. Importantly, the bill only applies to future city annexations and is not retroactive. Territories that have already been annexed to cities will still need to be annexed to the Metro service district, using the existing Metro service district annexation application process, before a city can authorize their urban development.

<u>Discussion Highlights & Next Steps</u>:

- Committee members expressed appreciation for this change.
- Committee members sought clarity around UGB expansions that automatically have a Metro service district annexation today. Metro staff confirmed that this is now the case, but that prior to 2009 it was not the case for territories already in the UGB.
- Committee members inquired if the following requirement to be within the corporate limits of a city was a State or Metro statute: a property to be urbanized by a city in the Metro region, it

must be within both Metro's urban growth boundary (UGB) and the Metro service district boundary, as well as within the corporate limits of that city.

Metro staff stated it is both a State and Metro Statute. Title 11 of the Urban Growth
Management Functional Plan requires territories to be added to a city. State law
provisions also say that when a city annexes a territory, it also needs to be annexed to
all of the service districts – of which includes Metro.

Next Steps:

Metro staff will propose conforming amendments to Metro Code later this year. MTAC
will have the opportunity to review the proposed amendments and make
recommendations to the Metro Policy Advisory Committee. Metro staff will also provide
relevant guidance to cities before January.

Comprehensive Climate Action Plan

The Comprehensive Climate Action Plan (CCAP) seeks to identify key actions that the Portland-Vancouver metropolitan area can take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. This includes Clackamas, Clark, Columbia, Multnomah, Skamania, Washington and Yamhill counties. Over the past 10 months, Metro has completed significant engagement and analysis to help identify the draft list of climate actions being proposed for the draft CCAP. These actions underwent a cost-benefit analysis. Metro staff presented on the CCAP and requested feedback from MTAC on the following questions:

- Does MTAC have feedback about the draft list of climate actions being proposed for the draft CCAP?
- Does MTAC have any additional feedback for staff as they work to finalize this plan?

Discussion Highlights & Next Steps:

- Committee members discussed the three major categories indicated to contribute over 90% of emissions in the Metro region: 1) Food, Goods and Services, 2) Building Energy, and 3)
 Transportation Energy.
 - It was clarified that emissions from the transportation of foods, goods, and services were included in the Foods, Goods, and Services category, not the Transportation Energy category.
- Per a question from a Committee Member, Metro staff stated that Metro Council will endorse
 but not adopt the CCAP. The intention is that the plan will help answer questions for the next
 Regional Transportation Plan and that it will allow for the sharing of ideas amongst local
 partners and offer guidance for climate actions local jurisdictions can take.
- Committee members discussed that pricing is really complicated and nuanced.
- Public participation was discussed, with Committee members offering a variety of ideas on how
 the public could be best engaged in order to gather specific feedback on what climate actions
 people in the region would be most willing to implement.
- Next Steps:
 - August 5, 2025: Metro will release the draft CCAP for public comment via an online open house.
 - September 2025: Metro will continue engagement to collect and address feedback on draft plan.
 - October 2025: Metro staff will present recommended changes to the draft CCAP to Metro Council.

- November 2025: Metro Council considers endorsing the CCAP by Metro resolution.
- December 2025: Metro staff submits final CCAP to the EPA, as required by federal grant funding for this work.

Regional Housing Coordination Strategy

Metro staff provided an update on the Regional Housing Coordination Strategy (RHCS), which the State requires be completed by the end of 2025. Metro has been convening an Implementers Work Group with members from throughout the district and they have refined a revised List of Actions to be included in the RHCS. These actions were presented at MTAC and Committee members were invited to rank the actions.

Discussion Highlights & Next Steps:

- Committee members asked about the process for items currently on the list that ultimately will
 not be selected. Metro staff stated that they will retain all ideas as some may be useful in the
 future, but ultimately need to produce a package they know they can implement in the next 6
 years.
- It was noted that the list does not reflect all of the things Metro is already doing and that there needs to be documentation on all that is already happening.
- Committee members discussed the opportunity for education on policy trade-offs, with the example being given that there are assumptions made in the Urban Growth Report about process for redevelopment of mobile home communities that may not be accurate.
- Interest was expressed in a permitting and production dashboard, but many Committee
 members noted that it would need to be really user-friendly so as to not add to the burden of
 already scarce staff resources.
- Committee members encouraged a coordinated legislative strategy on housing in the region, with one member specifically suggesting a regional infrastructure finance strategy be a component.
- Next Steps:
 - Release draft strategy to MTAC/MPAC in October
 - Metro Council will need to adopt by December
