WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD?

This is an informational update only on the 2025 Point-in-Time Count of people experiencing homelessness in Clackamas County.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night. Sheltered means staying in a safety off the streets program and unsheltered means living in a place not meant for human habitation. The U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) requires that Continuums of Care (CoC) plan, coordinate, and carry out these counts no less than bi-annually and report on the data and findings. As the local Continuum of Care Lead Agency, Clackamas County's count is carried out by the Housing & Community Development Division. In addition to providing valuable information about the prevalence of homelessness in our community (in-flow vs. out-flow), HUD uses the PIT Count to measure the performance of the CoC's efforts to respond to homelessness. Beginning in 2022, Clackamas County joined Multnomah and Washington Counties in conducting coordinated regional PIT Counts.

For this year's Count, carried out in January, the three counties contracted with Portland State University to support the regional count and conduct data analyses of regional data. Performing a regional count presents a number of system improvement opportunities, including further regionalization efforts consistent with the implantation of the Supportive Housing Services Measure and improving the consistency and quality of the data collected across the three counties. A regional report on the outcomes of the 2025 PIT Count will be provided this summer and a local Clackamas County PIT report will be produced by staff by June. This update is to provide the Board with high level outcomes of this year's PIT Count and its relation to the previous regional count conducted in January 2023.












Additional characteristics of individuals counted as homeless in 2025












Race and ethnicity of individuals counted as homeless in 2025
