II. Housekeeping

August 06, 2026 meeting minutes approved.

III. Denyse McGriff Introduction

Denyse McGriff, Mayor of Oregon City, introduced herself as the newest appointee to the TriMet Board of Directors representing District 7.

IV. Conversation with Grace Curnican, Rebuilding our Transportation Vision Workgroup

Grace Crunican provided an update on the Rebuilding Our Transportation Vision Work Group. A report is due to the governor by the end of December and is expected to provide a menu of levers. Participants raised questions about messaging, right-sizing project commitments to anticipated revenue, and when a new ODOT director will be appointed. Members expressed interest in local revenue sharing, enhancing ODOT's operational capabilities, and appreciated the diverse voices and breadth of analysis of potential revenue sources. Concerns were also raised regarding a prior tolling initiative, trust, and public sentiment.

V. Update on Governor's Economic Prosperity Roadmap

Kathy Hyzy, Regional Solutions, presented on the Prosperity Roadmap, a state effort to retain and grow businesses, catalyze job creation, and accelerate economic growth. The roadmap includes six strategic initiatives, such as recruiting leadership, establishing a fast-track permitting program, and reducing barriers to investment. A prosperity council has advised on strategies to achieve goals in the prosperity roadmap. Kathy shared strategies that are currently under consideration. Participants highlighted the need for adequate industrial site readiness funding, tax burden challenges, the unique needs of small and micro-businesses, and questions about substance use.

VI. Other Business

- R1ACT received a presentation about ODOT's Construction Improvement Plan. Projects that cost more than \$100m, irrespective of smaller phases, have been placed on the shelf. Councilor Lewis advocated that the CIP should be updated annually.
- JPACT has been discussing MTIP updates to the Interstate Bridge Replacement Project and Rose Quarter Project. I-5 will experience a traffic closure. Engagement is underway on the RTP, and JPACT will hear about transportation system management grants this fall. JPACT's trip to Washington, D.C. has been postponed.
- September is National Recovery Month. Mayor Buck noted high substance use disorder rates in Oregon, expressing concern that the state raises revenue from taxes on nicotine and gambling.
- MPAC previously discussed updates on the Future Vision Project, Regional Transportation work plan, and Community Connector Transit Study.

Background

Two organizations in Clackamas County have expressed intent to apply for PROTECT grant funding, including Clackamas County and the City of Milwaukie:

Rock Creek Junction Reconfiguration Project (Clackamas County)

Improvements will expand the signalized intersection at Rock Creek Junction, improve bike and pedestrian facilities, and widen and seismically retrofit the existing bridge on OR Highway 212. Rock Creek Junction is part of OR Highway 212/224, an Oregon Tier 2 seismic lifeline route and county-designated multi-hazard evacuation route.

Kellogg Creek Bridge Replacement Project (City of Milwaukie)

Improvements will remove a 14.5-acre impoundment behind a weir constructed in 1848 to alleviate high-water events, provide seismic upgrades to a freight railroad trestle, and restore fish passage into the Kellogg-Mt. Scott Creeks. Kellogg Creek Bridge is part of Highway 99E, a Tier 1 Regional Emergency Transportation Route.

The PROTECT Competitive Grant Program provides funding to plan for and make surface transportation more resilient to current and future weather events, natural disasters, and changing conditions, such as severe storms, flooding, drought, levee and dam failures, wildfire, rockslides, mudslides, sea level rise, extreme weather, including extreme temperatures, and earthquakes.

The PROTECT Competitive Grant Program funds projects that improve the resilience of the surface transportation system, including highways, public transportation, ports, and intercity passenger rail. Program goals include protecting: surface transportation assets by making them more resilient; communities through resilience improvements and strategies that allow for the continued operation or rapid recovery of surface transportation systems; coastal infrastructure; and natural infrastructure that protects and enhances surface transportation assets.

Background

The Clackamas County Coordinating Committee (C4), an advisory group to the BCC, has expressed interest in collaborating to advance joint advocacy documents on economic development and transportation policies. These documents are intended to reflect shared “values and outcomes” on these two topics ahead of the 2027 state legislative session. C4 has developed similar documents previously, representing the “Communities of Clackamas County”.

Over the summer, county staff reviewed feedback from recent C4 meetings, a local economic development survey, and additional input from county technical staff. These insights were incorporated into discussion draft V&O documents to serve as a starting point for discussion.

C4 will review this draft at their October 1 C4 meeting, with a request to submit additional feedback to C4@clackamas.us by October 23. Revised drafts are anticipated to come back to C4 in November and into the winter.
